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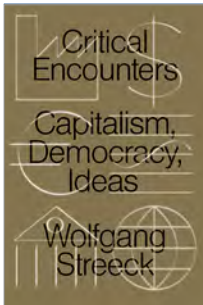

From the acclaimed author of *How Will Capitalism End?* comes an omnibus of long-form critical essays engaging with leading economists and thinkers. *Critical Encounters* draws on Wolfgang Streeck's inimitable writing for the *London Review of Books* and *New Left Review*, among other publications. It opens with treatments of two contrasting historical eras – factory capitalism and financialization – and three of the world's major economies: the United States, France, and Germany. A middle section surveys the hollowing out of Western democracies and reviews Yanis Varoufakis's "strange but indispensable" memoir of the eurozone crisis. Delving into the world of ideas, Streeck discusses the work of Quinn Slobodian, Mark Blyth, Jürgen Habermas, and Perry Anderson. Finally, he zooms out to compare his home discipline of sociology to natural history, giving a remarkable and non-deterministic reading of Charles Darwin. In the preface, Streeck reflects on the art (or craft) of book reviewing and the continuing merits of the book form. *Critical Encounters* also includes a series of "Letters from Europe," penned as the coronavirus descended upon the Continent.

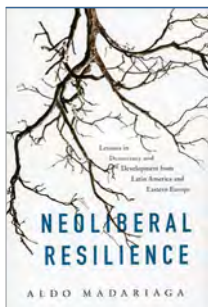

La Salada is South America's largest marketplace for fraudulently labeled clothing, a sprawling and dangerous bazaar on the fringes of Buenos Aires where counterfeit goods are bought and sold, armed thieves roam the nearby streets, and corrupt police and politicians turn a blind eye to widespread unlawful behaviors. Despite conditions traditionally considered inhospitable to economic growth –

including acute interpersonal distrust, pervasive personal insecurity, and rampant violence – business in La Salada is booming under an established order completely detached from the state. Matías Dewey dives deep into the world of La Salada to examine how market exchanges function outside the law and how agreements and norms develop in the economy for counterfeit clothing. Drawing on seven months of ethnographic research and more than a hundred interviews, Dewey argues that aspirations for a better future shape garment workers’ everyday practices, from their home-based sweatshops to the market stalls. The book unearths a new configuration of garment production and commercialization detached from global supply chains, submerged in the shadows of informality and illegality, and rooted in aspiration and opportunity.

Since the 1980s, neoliberalism has withstood repeated economic shocks and financial crises to become the hegemonic economic policy worldwide. Why has it remained so resilient? What is the relationship between this resiliency and the backsliding of Western democracy? Can democracy survive an increasingly authoritarian neoliberal capitalism? *Neoliberal Resilience* answers these questions by bringing the developing world’s recent history to the forefront of our thinking about democratic capitalism’s future. Looking at four countries once considered leading examples of effective neoliberal policy – Argentina, Chile, Estonia, and Poland – Madariaga examines domestic actors and institutions that defend neoliberalism. He demonstrates that neoliberalism’s political power is strongest in countries where traditional democratic principles have been slowly and purposefully weakened. He identifies three mechanisms that have propagated neoliberalism’s success: privatization of state companies to create a supporting business class, use of political institutions to block the representation of alternatives, and constitutionalization of key economic policies to shield them from partisan influence. Madariaga reflects on current pressing issues, including the influence of austerity and the rise of populism.

*Social Protection, Capitalist Production* provides a thorough analysis of the genealogy and the functional logic of German capitalism over the last 130 years. It addresses several puzzles of the existing literature, in particular how economic coordination proved possible and remained stable in a big) country without prominent traits of neo-corporatism, without long government participation of social democratic parties, without centralized wage bargaining, without active economic steering by the government, under a “monetarist” regime, and under an allegedly liberal, namely “ordoliberal,” economic policy. The central claim of the book is that the functional equivalent was a “conservative-continental” welfare state which provided labor and capital with the organizational resources and the infrastructure to establish and maintain long-term economic coordination. A better understanding of the German case thus provides us also with a much better understanding of the different variants of coordinated market economies in Northern, Continental, and Southern Europe.

Die Mehrheit der Weltbevölkerung arbeitet in Schattenmärkten. Mit zunehmender Tendenz. Die Autoren zeigen, wie solche illegalen Märkte funktionieren, wie Menschen dort leben und arbeiten. Ihre Analyse überrascht und verändert den Blick auf dieses Wirtschaften. Markenpiraterie und Sweatshops in Argentinien, Diamanten in Sierra Leone und Rhinozeroshorn im südlichen Afrika – an diesen Orten führten die Forscher Matías Dewey, Nina Engwicht und Annette Hübschle im Rahmen ihrer Arbeit am Max-Planck-Institut für Gesellschaftsforschung Hunderte Gespräche mit Arbeitern, Produzenten, Ermittlern oder Politikern. Sie analysieren den Alltag auf diesen geheimen Märkten, der geprägt ist durch Selbst- und Fremdausbeutung, durch die Armut vieler und den Wohlstand weniger, durch findige Unternehmer sowie skrupellose Kriminelle. Aber illegale Marktteilnehmer agieren oft auch überraschend friedlich und kreativ, um Geschäfte im rechtsfreien Raum zu ermöglichen. Trotz harter Konkurrenz helfen sie sich häufig gegenseitig, schaffen ein eigenes Regelwerk, Kreditringe oder solidarische Notfallfonds. Neben der Schattenwirtschaft entsteht ein politisches und soziales Schattensystem. In bestimmten Fällen profitiert sogar die Allgemeinheit von illegalen Märkten, etwa wenn die lokale Wirtschaft gefördert wird. Der Wirtschaftsjournalist Caspar Dohmen spannt den Bogen zu den allgemeinen Arbeitsverhältnissen im 21. Jahrhundert, denn die Grenzen zwischen Legalität und Illegalität verschwimmen zusehends.

Schattenbanken und Kreditverbriefung haben die globale Finanzkrise ausgelöst. Dennoch fördert die Europäische Kommission mit dem nur wenige Jahre später aufgelegten Projekt einer Europäischen Kapitalmarktunion aktiv marktbasierete Finanzpraktiken. Marina Hübner zeigt, dass dies nicht etwa das Ergebnis erfolgreichen Lobbyings ist. Die Ursache der Rehabilitation dieser Finanzpraktiken liegt vielmehr in der unvollendeten Struktur der Europäischen Währungsunion. Reformen in der Governance-Architektur des Euro sind anfällig für Blockaden, sobald sie Umverteilung zwischen den Mitgliedsländern der Eurozone hervorzurufen drohen. 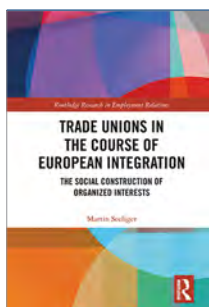

Die Soziologin und Politikwissenschaftlerin Renate Mayntz (\*1929) gehörte über viele Jahrzehnte zu den führenden Vertretern erst der Gemeindestudien und Organisationssoziologie, dann der Verwaltungswissenschaft und später der Gesellschaftsforschung. Ihre Vita ist mit einer Reihe von Schlüsselereignissen der deutschen Zeitgeschichte verknüpft. Die Nachkriegszeit erlebte sie unter amerikanischer Besatzung, die Ereignisse um „1968“ an der Freien Universität in West-Berlin. Während der Kanzlerschaft Willy Brandts engagierte sich Mayntz in der Politikberatung und verarbeitete die dort gewonnenen Erfahrungen später in ihrer wissenschaftlichen Arbeit. Im Gespräch mit Ariane Leendertz und Uwe Schimank blickt die Gründungsdirektorin des Max-Planck-Instituts für Gesellschaftsfor-

schung auf ihre Lebensgeschichte und ihren beruflichen Werdegang zurück und erläutert ihr Selbstverständnis als eine der Aufklärung durch Wissenschaft verpflichtete Sozialwissenschaftlerin.

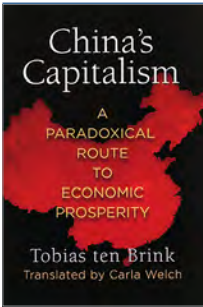

From the perspective of trade unions, European integration makes it more necessary than ever before to establish common political positions. At the same time, increasing heterogeneity between the member states makes the crafting of such positions more and more difficult. Can, under these circumstances, a joint political line among European trade unions emerge? To answer this question, the book sheds light on transnational trade union cooperation in the three most important policy fields: the debate around the freedom of services, the discussion over a European minimum wage, and the efforts of international wage coordination. Drawing on the results of extensive field research based on a qualitative study among trade unions from Hungary, Poland, Sweden, and Germany, as well as representatives from the European level, this book points to a significant gap in European trade union politics between pretensions and reality. The findings provide a solid theoretical framework, suitable not only to explain current dynamics in the field of European trade unionism, but also promising for further research on the topic. With its focus on a contested political field, *Trade Unions in the Course of European Integration* contributes to practical and theoretical debates within European trade unionism. As an adequate understanding of European trade unionism in general and collective bargaining requires a twofold perspective on European integration and the role of trade unions in European labor relations, two fields of scholarly interest are being addressed. Moreover, with its focus on European trade unionism as an internationalist project of labor politics, the book will also appeal to those interested in the field of Global Labor Studies.

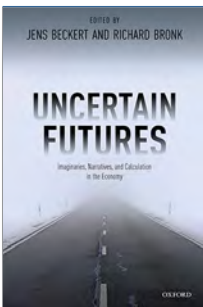

Since 1978, economic growth in China has outperformed every previous economic expansion in modern history. As major Western economies struggle with the effects of the deepest recession since WWII, the People's Republic enjoys massive growth rates by comparison. Tireless expansion and inventiveness join a national euphoria in which anything seems possible as China is poised to become a global engine for innovation. In *China's Capitalism*, Tobias ten Brink uses empirical evidence and theories of comparative and international political economy to explore characteristics of China's socioeconomic system over time, identify key dynamics shaping the system's structure, and discuss trends in capitalist development. He argues that hegemonic state-business alliances, relative homogeneity of party-state elites, a low-wage regime, and coincidences between domestic and global processes drive China's rise, and he surveys the limits to the state's influence over economic and social developments such as industrial overcapacity and social conflict. Translated from the original German edition, *Chinas Kapitalismus* (Campus, 2013), *China's Capitalism* presents a coherent and historically nuanced portrait of the socioeconomic order of the PRC and the challenges facing its development.

*Uncertain Futures* considers how economic actors visualize the future and decide how to act in conditions of radical uncertainty. It starts from the premise that dynamic capitalist economies are characterized by relentless innovation and novelty and hence exhibit an indeterminacy that cannot be reduced to measurable risk. The organizing

question then becomes how economic actors form expectations and make decisions despite the uncertainty they face. This edited volume lays the foundations for a new model of economic reasoning by showing how, in conditions of uncertainty, economic actors combine calculation with imaginaries and narratives to form fictional expectations that coordinate action and provide the confidence to act. It draws on groundbreaking research in economic sociology, economics, anthropology, and psychology to present theoretically grounded empirical case studies. These demonstrate how grand narratives, central bank forward guidance, economic forecasts, finance models, business plans, visions of technological futures, and new era stories influence behaviour and become instruments of power in markets and societies. The market impact of shared calculative devices, social narratives, and contingent imaginaries underlines the rationale for a new form of narrative economics.

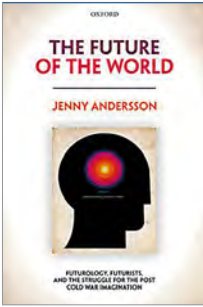

Im kapitalistischen Wirtschaftssystem richten Konsumenten, Investoren und Unternehmerinnen ihr Handeln auf die Zukunft aus. Diese birgt Chancen und Risiken, ist aber vor allem eines: ungewiss. Wie gehen die Akteure mit dieser Ungewissheit um? Ökonomen beantworten diese Frage mit verschiedenen Theorien, die auf die Berechenbarkeit des Marktes setzen. Dadurch wird die Nichtvorhersagbarkeit der Zukunft unterschätzt. *The Future of the World* is devoted to the intriguing field of study which emerged after World War Two, futurism or futurology. Jenny Andersson explains how futurist scholars and researchers imagined the Cold War and post Cold War world and the tools and methods they would use to influence and change that world. Futurists were a motley crew of Cold War warriors, nuclear scientists, journalists, and peace activists. Some argued it should be a closed sphere of science defined by delimited probabilities. They were challenged by alternative notions of the future as a potentially open realm. Futurism also drew on an eclectic range of repertoires, some of which were deduced from positivist social science, mathematics, and nuclear physics, and some of which sprung from alternative forms of knowledge in science fiction, journalism, or religion. These different forms of prediction laid very different claims to how accurately futures could be known, and what kind of control could be exerted over what was yet to come. *The Future of the World* carefully examines these different engagements with the future, and inscribes them in the intellectual history of the post war period. Using unexplored archival collections, *The Future of the World* reconstructs the Cold War networks of futurologists and futurists.

Since the early 1980s, governments worldwide have taken many measures to expand the role of markets. Recent political events reflect widespread disenchantment with neoliberal policies, but it remains doubtful whether populist leaders will deliver the market restraints that many of their voters expect. This book explains the resilience

of marketization processes by highlighting the role of profiteers – namely those who, like the organizer of a cock fight, benefit from contests regardless of who wins. By setting up shop on the sidelines, profiteers accumulate resources that boost political efforts to maintain and expand the arena of competition. Evidence comes from the evolution of support for shareholder rights relating to takeover bids among key interest groups and political parties in three countries since the late nineteenth century.

Coalitions of consumer groups, NGOs, and trade unions have traditionally been considered politically weak compared to well-organized and resourceful financial sector groups which dominate or “capture” financial regulatory decisions. However, following the 2008 financial crisis, civil society groups have been seen to exert much more influence, with politicians successfully implementing financial reform in spite of industry opposition. Drawing on literature from social movement research and regulatory politics, this book shows how diffuse interests were represented in financial regulatory overhauls in both the United States and the European Union. Four cases of reform in the post-crisis regulatory context are analyzed: the creation of a new Consumer Financial Protection Bureau in the US; the introduction of new consumer protection regulations through EU directives; the failure of attempts to introduce a financial transaction tax in the US; and the agreement of 11 EU member states to introduce such a tax. It shows how building coalitions with important elite allies outside and inside government helped traditionally weak interest groups transcend a lack of material resources to influence and shape regulatory policy. By engaging with a less well-known side of the debate, it explains how business power was curbed and diverse interests translated into financial regulatory policy.

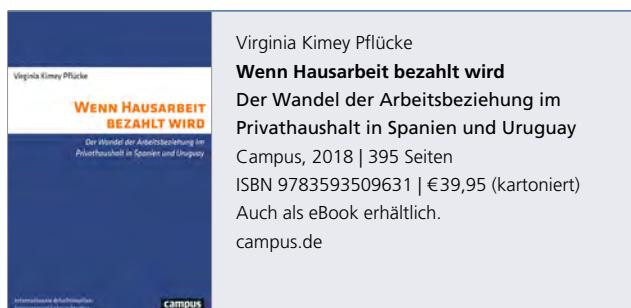

Niedrige Geburtenraten, unsichere Partnerschaften und prekäre Beschäftigung – mit diesen Entwicklungen sah sich Deutschland seit den 1970er-Jahren bis in die jüngste Vergangenheit konfrontiert. Doch welchen Einfluss haben Unsicherheiten in der Partnerschaft und im Erwerbsleben auf die Geburt des ersten und zweiten Kindes? Annina T. Hering beantwortet diese Frage auf der Grundlage von Daten des Sozio-ökonomischen Panels (SOEP). Virginia Kimey Pflücke untersucht diese Frage anhand eines historisch-soziologischen Vergleichs: Uruguay, das als Wegbereiter der Gleichstellung dieser Arbeitsbeziehung gilt, und Spanien, das europäische Land mit der größten Zahl an Hausangestellten. Die Studie zeigt die Entwicklung der bezahlten Hausarbeit von den Dienstmädchen des 19. Jahrhunderts, über erste Organisationen von Hausangestellten im angehenden 20. Jahrhundert, der Frauenfrage in den Gewerkschaften bis hin zur Dienstleistungsgesellschaft heute. So tritt die bewegte Geschichte von Arbeiterinnen hervor, in der sowohl politökonomische Strukturen als auch ideologische Kämpfe die Institutionalisierung der Hausarbeit bedingen.

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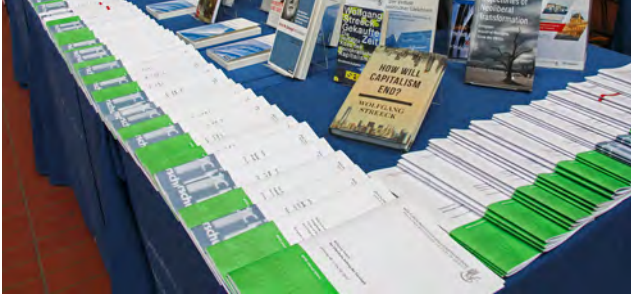
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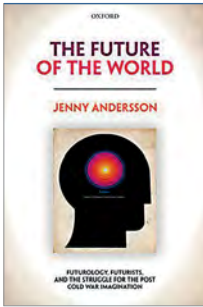

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*The Future of the World* is devoted to the intriguing field of study which emerged after World War Two, futurism or futurology. Jenny Andersson explains how futurist scholars and researchers imagined the Cold War and post Cold War world and the tools and methods they would use to influence and change that world. Futurists were a motley crew of Cold War warriors, nuclear scientists, journalists, and peace activists. Some argued it should be a closed sphere of science defined by delimited probabilities. They were challenged by alternative notions of the future as a potentially open realm. Futurism also drew on an eclectic range of repertoires, some of which were deduced from positivist social science, mathematics, and nuclear physics, and some of which sprung from alternative forms of knowledge in science fiction, journalism, or religion. These different forms of prediction laid very different claims to how accurately futures could be known, and what kind of control could be exerted over what was yet to come. *The Future of the World* carefully examines these different engagements with the future, and inscribes them in the intellectual history of the post war period. Using unexplored archival collections, *The Future of the World* reconstructs the Cold War networks of futurologists and futurists.

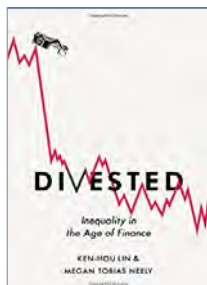

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Coalitions of consumer groups, NGOs, and trade unions have traditionally been considered politically weak compared to well-organized and resourceful financial sector groups which dominate or “capture” financial regulatory decisions. However, following the 2008 financial



crisis, civil society groups have been seen to exert much more influence, with politicians successfully implementing financial reform in spite of industry opposition. Drawing on literature from social movement research and regulatory politics, this book shows how diffuse interests were represented in financial regulatory overhauls in both the United States and the European Union. It shows how building coalitions with important elite allies outside and inside government helped traditionally weak interest groups transcend a lack of material resources to influence and shape regulatory policy. By engaging with a less well-known side of the debate, it explains how business power was curbed and diverse interests translated into financial regulatory policy.

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Finance is an inescapable part of American life. From how one pursues an education, buys a home, runs a business, or saves for retirement, finance orders the lives of ordinary Americans. And as finance continues to expand, inequality soars. In *Divested*, Ken-Hou Lin and Megan Tobias Neely demonstrate why widening inequality cannot be understood without examining the rise of big finance. The growth of the financial sector has dramatically transformed the American economy by redistributing resources from workers and families into the hands of owners, executives, and financial professionals. The average American is now divested from a world driven by the maximization of financial profit. Lin and Neely provide systematic evidence to document how the ascendance of finance on Wall Street, Main Street, and among households is a fundamental cause of economic inequality. They argue that finance has reshaped the economy in three important ways. First, the financial sector extracts resources from the economy at large without providing economic benefits to those outside the financial services industry. Second, firms in other economic sectors have become increasingly involved in lending and investing, which weakens the demand for labor and the bargaining power of workers. And third, the escalating consumption of financial products by households shifts risks and uncertainties once shouldered by unions, corporations, and governments onto families. A clear, comprehensive, and convincing account of the forces driving economic inequality in America, *Divested* warns us that the most damaging consequence of the expanding financial system is not simply recurrent financial crises but a widening social divide between the have and have-nots.



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
